

Alumni Spotlights

Dr. Karlem Riess, Mu (Tulane) '33, was recently awarded the Tulane University President's Medal. Tulane University President Scott S. Cowen established the Tulane University President's Medal



in 1999. The medal is awarded at the sole discretion of the president to individuals who have distinguished themselves by their actions and who have contributed in some manner to the well-being of Tulane University. Unlike the honorary degree, this award may commemorate deeds

other than academic achievement. Designed by professor emeritus Franklin Adams, the medal features a sculpted TU symbol. This vear's commencement speaker, William Safire, and J. Karlem Fless, emeritus professor of physics, were honored as recipients of the Tulane University President's Medal for 2002. Riess received a bachelor of science from Tulane's College of Arts and Sciences (now Tulane College) in 1933 and a master's degree in mathematics from the Graduate School in 1935. After earning a doctorate in physics from Brown University (1943), Riess began teaching at Tulane, serving the university for more than half a century. Fondly known as "Ducky," Fiess was an an advisor to Fraternities for 38 years and served as the university marshal at commencement ceremonies for 25 years. Previous recipients of the President's Medal are Lindy Boggs, Marian Wright Edelman, Walter Isaacson and Cokie Poberts.

Dr. Riess is one of Phi Kappa Sigma's most distinguished and beloved alumni. He has given much to the Fraternity over his long life, serving as the Chapter Advisor for Mu Chapter for many years, Grand R from 1985-1989 and as a Director of the Phi Kappa Sigma Foundation and Archivist. We congratulate Dr. Riess on his latest achievement and wish to thank him once again for all of his hard work and dedication to Phi Kappa Sigma.



The Grand Chapter is the chief legislative body of our Fraternity and each chapter is required by the International Constitution and Acts to send at least one delegate and its Chapter Advisor. Chapter representation is critical at Grand Chapter since we will be discussing and voting on issues that will shape the future of Phi Kappa Sigma for many years to come.

During Grand Chapter, both undergraduates and alumni will have the opportunity to attend educational sessions dealing with all aspects of Chapter operations and important issues facing college students today. Chapter Advisors, Volunteers and other Alumni will also benefit from programming specifically designed for them. We are planning several special activities while in New Orleans and all attendees will have plenty of time to go out and explore that beautiful city. Your Mission, Should You Choose to Accept It By Chris Hanes, Director of Chapter Services and Toby Smith, Executive Director

Every organization has a purpose and this purpose stems from the values on which the organization was founded. Since 1850, Phi Kappa Sigma's purpose has been represented by the "Objects of the Fraternity", which is written in the Phi Kappa Sigma Constitution and Acts, Article II and states the following:

"The objects of the Fraternity shall be the promotion of good fellowship and the cultivation of the social virtues among its members; the protection of the just rights and the advancement of the best interests, present and future, individual and collective, of all those who shall be associated together as members of the Fraternity; the encouragement of good scholarship and breadth of training for its members; and cooperation in the educational and cultural programs of institutions of higher education in which chapters are located."

In that one sentence, our Founding Fathers conveyed everything they envisioned Phi Kappa Sigma to be. Somewhere in the last 150 years we seem to have lost some of the meaning of what they wrote and have drifted off course. We must take the time to reflect and re-educate ourselves on why Phi Kappa Sigma was created, and what we should be doing to bring ourselves back on track. Leukemia, as opposed to the Chronic forms, are usually easier to cure. The Lymphocytic variety comes from lymphocytes, which is a common white blood cell active in identifying and marking germs to be killed. Luckily, the cancer was found quickly. It can be fatal within months if not treated.

Upon receiving the news, Tory called a couple of Brothers and informed them of the recent events. Tory was to begin chemotherapy the Monday after Easter. As the days passed from diagnosis to treatment, Tory kept in contact with the Brothers of the Chapter. He spoke of how important the Brothers of the Delta Iota Chapter had become to him. During our frequent conversations and visits, Tory seemed energetic and determined to fight the cancer. Studies have reflected that staying optimistic helps one's body deal with the chemotherapy better, leading to a speedy recovery in many cases. Well, Tory had just that, along with several other beneficial attributes such as great physical condition, and his young age. He repeatedly stated to our Brothers that he didn't want to be treated differently by anyone because of the cancer. With this positive outlook on such a devastating event, Tory became an inspiration for many of his classmates and Brothers at Marist.

The Brothers were determined to help Tory in any way possible. One of the most meaningful events that took place was when his pledge Brothers called him up during the Greek Week Talent show and sang Pink Floyd's "Wish You Were Here," in front of the entire Marist Greek Community.

Tory's appreciation for those Brothers at Marist was manifested in the form of tears coming from him after the song was completed. Also, recently the Chapter was able to do a philanthropy event for Tory. In a three-day event, the Brothers at Marist were able to raise a large amount of money for Tory and more importantly inform the Campus of Marist College as to what Leukemia is and what can be done to fight it. The event was deemed very successful by our governing board. Several other Greek organizations showed their support with cards, posters, phone calls, and all-around best wishes.

Tory was able to rise above his physical ailment with support from his friends, Brothers, and family. As of April 24th 2002, Tory is out of the hospital and receiving treatment from his home. He hopes to return to Marist in the fall of 2002. We will continually extend our full support to Tory and his family, and keep the International Headquarters informed of his progress.

The Brothers of Delta Iota and the International Headquarters ask that you increase your efforts to support the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. 

Zeta Chapter at F&M College initiated 18 new members over the year and raised over \$1,000 for Leukemia and



The Right Way to Recruit!

How Beta Theta (TCU) and Alpha Nu (Georgia Tech) Excel at Recruitment and on Their Campus

Over the past few years, there have been many changes within Phi Kappa Sigma and the Greek Community. These changes have been made to improve the Fraternity and to make Phi Kappa Sigma stronger. A few Chapters are still struggling with recruiting without alcohol and at these Chapters we are seeing a decrease in membership. Many of you think the reason for that decrease is that we cannot drink in the houses, so we cannot compete with the other houses on campus. The truth is that students are not looking for a place to be hazed, binge drink, live in filth, fail out, and become hated by others. They are looking for a clean, safe place to live where they will have friends that will last them a lifetime. They will have memories, not black outs. They will graduate with good grades and get a good job. They will have support throughout their college careers. Phi Kappa Sigma can do all that and more. We just need to know how to promote ourselves and how to recruit.

The Alpha Nu and Beta Theta Chapters have done that. Both are very organized, well established, and have been working on improving and maintaining their Chapter's high standards, and status at their campuses. Neither Chapter promotes alcohol during recruitment. Alcohol is prohibited in the house at all times, and the two Chapters have no tolerance for hazing. Both Chapters took in an average of 25 new members this year, and are among our largest Chapters. The University, community, and their fellow Greeks respect them and they are both top Chapters at their schools and within Phi Kappa Sigma.

What TCU and Georgia Tech have found is that promoting all aspects of the Fraternity, such as scholarship, academics, community service, philanthropy, Brotherhood, and social events will greatly improve their recruitment. Concentrating only on parties and drinking will bring your Chapter down. At one time in their history, both Chapters went through a period when hazing ran rampant, and kegs were abundant. The Chapters had low numbers, no respect, and were slowly dying. The Chapters realized that a change was needed in order for them to survive. Within a semester, Georgia Tech transformed their Chapter into a respected group on campus. The Chapter recruited 24 men in the fall, which was the largest recruitment on campus, and not a drop of alcohol was used. TCU has continued to improve since the mid 90s. Students are attracted to this Chapter because of its clean house, organization, respect, and strong Brotherhood. Both Georgia Tech and TCU have realized the true purpose of Fraternity and have become well-rounded Chapters with well-rounded members. Many of our Chapters have begun to embrace this philosophy, and over the past year, we have seen an increase in membership. Phi Kappa Sigma will continue to be a leader among the Greek Community if we continue to follow the founding principles of our Fraternity.

MITCHELL CHAPTER STANDARDS AWARDS FOR 2000-2001

The Mitchell Chapter Standards Program (MCS) was implemented in 1994 to lend structure to the common goals of which all Phi Kappa Sigma chapters should be aspiring to attain. The intent of the program was, and still is, to provide the chapter and the International Fraternity with a means of assessing performance on an annual basis.

The MCS assesses a Chapter's performance in six areas: Chapter Management, Financial Management, Risk Management, Fraternity Involvement, Community Involvement, and Membership Development. It also allows the Chapters to receive bonus points for going above and beyond the call of duty. The Mitchell Chapter Standards Application is due at International Headquarters by June 1st of each year. Winners are announced either at Grand Chapter or in September of a non-convention year.

MCS helps us work together to build upon Chapters' strengths and to improve upon areas of weakness. The program is also used to help the International Fraternity recognize chapters worthy of awards or special recognition. The Chapters and individuals who received awards for the 2000-2001 School year are listed below. They will receive their awards along with this year's winners at the 91st Grand Chapter in New Orleans, Louisiana.




