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
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

WRITE BETTER



the Year, David C. Spraker made the single largest donation to the Phi Kappa Sigma Foundation as well as donations to Alpha Theta Chapter at the University of Wisconsin, the university's scholarship fund, and the Salvation Army. His total contributions to Phi Kappa Sigma exceeded \$1.5 million...

In April 2009, the Wisconsin alumni developed The Badger Skulls Alumni Association (BSAA) with the mission to perpetuate the existence of the Alpha Theta Chapter by supporting the undergraduate members and uniting the rest of the chapter's alumni base. The BSAA assists the undergraduate chapter in a multitude of ways. In addition to successfully managing Brother Spraker's endowment, it assists the organization in the planning of alumni-related events throughout the year. Their biggest event contributions to the chapter include a yearly homecoming dinner, the Steak dinner in February, and a Parent-Alumni Banquet in April. Since its inception, the BSAA had made the acquisition of a chapter property a primary goal. Last August, this goal was achieved

with the completion of the chapter property, affectionately known to chapter members as 'The Crypt.'

The Crypt is an 1,800 square foot commercial property providing the members and active alumni a space to hold meetings, run events, study, and relax. In the semester since its completion, The Crypt has been visited over one thousand times by chapter members for recruitment, social, professional development, and alumni events. The Crypt welcomed Wilson Wong and Being Plaid in October as members prepared for a big Spring recruitment push. Without an official chapter house on campus, The Crypt has allowed the brothers of Alpha Theta a common meeting place without the liabilities of a standard chapter house.

The Crypt includes many features that improve chapter productivity and encourage brotherhood within the organization. The meeting space can accommodate seating for up to fifty people or desks for twenty-four people. When not in use for meetings, the space transforms into an entertainment center, swapping desks and chairs for couches and LovSacs. The Crypt includes a kitchenette with a full size refrigerator, pizza

oven, and Keurig coffee maker.

EDEFINING FRATERNITY HOUSING

Alongside the standard furnishings, the BSAA made it a priority to provide the members with state of the art technological equipment. The main recreational area includes a fifteen-foot projection screen TV equipped with Bose surround sound, four different gaming systems, and Apple TV. Within the conference room is a Mac Mini attached to two widescreen TVs serving as monitors. Any Apple device can be paired up with the main projector with Apple AirPlay allowing wireless connectivity throughout the space. The conference room also features a large whiteboard wall that can be used for everything from semester planning to working on homework problems.

Over the last six years, the BSAA has grown to over 250 active alumni members of Alpha Theta chapter, working together to manage the chapter's endowment.

In addition to the BSAA, the Key and Scepter Society, a not-for-profit organization, was established in 2013. The organization's goal is to raise funds for scholarships, provide travel and registration money for conferences, and coordinate educational programs for the entire university.

NATIONAL HOUSING CORPORATION CREATED TO ASSIST CHAPTERS WITH HOUSE MANAGEMENT, FINANCING AND HOUSING RENOVATIONS

WE ARE PROUD TO ANNOUNCE THE establishment of our National Housing Corporation (NHC) to help with all aspects of chapter housing. Structurally modeled after several long-running, successful Greek organizations' NHC's, our's is an independent corporation not part of our International Fraternity, but working closely when needed with our Executive Committee and HQ. We are a non-profit, non-charitable, 501(c)(2) Limited

Liability Corporation (LLC)

formed in early 2013.

This undertaking is a large topic but we wanted to share some initial information now and ask all our chapters and alumni associations to please let us know how we can help you by going www.tiny.cc/nhc_survey and providing your chapter's basic housing information and needs. First, you need to know participation in the NHC by local housing corporations is voluntary. We encourage each alumni association/housing corporation to participate in Grand Chapter 2014 where the NHC will be offering chapter housing and property management workshops and presenting in-depth information explaining the role and function of our NHC. Most importantly, we'll be listening to each of you to better understand your housing needs and goals.

CASE STUDY

The NHC was officially formed after years of information gathering with a 12 member committee then "fast-tracked" out of a critical need at the University of Illinois (Rho) Chapter which was experiencing financial and membership difficulties following years of fighting a losing battle with a deteriorating, 100-plus year old chapter house – a situation many of our chapters are finding themselves. The house was in danger of being lost for good. The NHC was able to successfully broker a long-term deal with a revamped, committed alumni group in planning, financing, and executing both chapter house

and membership redevelopment. These efforts resulted in a \$700,000 NHC financed and headquarters-managed redevelopment of Illinois' undergraduate chapter house remodel and signing of a 6-year property lease with the National Housing Corporation. In conjunction with the Rho Chapter alumni, we commissioned a "Strategic Housing Plan" which serves as the basis for designing, financing, and building a brand new chapter house for our growing group at the University of Illinois.

MOVING FORWARD

The NHC hopes to work in similar ways with other chapters to help solve individual housing challenges and develop long-term housing solutions which provide the updated amenities students and parents now expect. Phi Kappa Sigma needs to offer competitive member housing options. This process requires a long-term, organized commitment our NHC can provide. We have the ability to help finance property developments and acquisitions and we offer help in legal or contract issues, property management, and contracting assistance. Please go to our website (www.nhcpks.org) for more detailed information on the NHC and service offerings.

made headlines this past November for allegedly "bullying" teammate Jonathan Martin over the entirety of his short career. It got so bad that Martin quit the team and the Dolphins were eventually forced to suspend Incognito indefinitely. Targeting this one player for discipline is reactive and points directly at a larger issue within the NFL: hazing is a culturally accepted reality.

HBO's Hard Knocks annually shows us the culture of rookie abuse that is seemingly rampant in the league. ESPN's Mike Golic routinely speaks of his former playing days, recalling fond memories of making young teammates carry pads for him to establish camaraderie. From demeaning haircuts to being left to pick up \$30,000 meal tabs, viewers should realize that the player whose jersey they wear was likely hazed at some point in his career.

Currently, 44 states have specific laws against hazing that closely match the above definition. All 32 NFL teams are located within these states, yet Ritchie Incognito is the first league case of serious disciplinary action related to hazing. Commissioner Roger Goodell has been silent about this culture despite the recent push for player safety on the field. Liability concerns relating

to concussions have caused the league to settle for \$765 million with former players; will it take an expensive lawsuit by victims like Jonathan Martin to get the NFL to stop condoning this illegal behavior?



Fraternities, on the other hand, have publically received such criticism due to a record of hazing. A recent study conducted by researchers at the University of Maine using data from 53 campuses across the country found that a shocking 73% of members of Greek organizations (male & female) reported being hazed during their undergraduate career. Phi Kappa Sigma's

insurance provider, Willis, insures 60 North American Interfraternity Conference fraternities and reports that, since 1997, they have paid out \$11,521,342 in hazing claims alone. This cost is one of the largest reasons our undergraduates are burdened with such a large annual insurance bill.

As Phi Kaps, we need to lead the charge against hazing in our communities. This starts with education. Our Pillars New Member Education Program includes several teachings on hazing prevention, including an interactive online learning module called GreekLifeEdu. We are also working tirelessly as a fraternity to educate our alumni volunteers about various prevention techniques. Our Skull Sessions manual reasons that our "new member education should help individuals become good brothers, and ultimately, successful alumni. When we haze (mentally or physically), we are training new members, not educating them. We are training new members who react but do not act, who obey but do not create, who conform but do not reform, and who get by but do not excel." Hazing should never be a factor in our brotherhood and it is more necessary than ever that we stand up for our values.



For his incredible coaching career and impact on the history of collegiate sports, the Executive Committee of Phi Kappa Sigma has named Al Scates (UCLA, 1961) the 2014 Alumnus of the Year. The Maltese Cross was lucky enough to chat with Al about his time as an active member of Phi Kap, his legendary coaching career, and what he's been up to since retiring in the summer of 2012.

MALTESE CROSS: When you joined your Chapter, did you consider yourself a strong leader?

COACH SCATES: Well I wasn't a leader at first in the Phi Kaps, but I was a leader when it came to sports. I was the captain and center for the Chapter basketball team. We beat all of the other fraternities in pretty heated competition back in those days. I would do whatever it took. I never wrestled, but we needed a heavyweight wrestler one year. I had to go up against another fraternity man in the finals and by some fluke I was able pin him and we won the match. I didn't really have the time to be an officer or a leader around the house. I had to work my way through school and I played on the volleyball team, but I did what I could on the athletic field.

MC: When you first came to college, did you want to join a fraternity and what made you choose Phi Kappa Sigma?

SCATES: When I went to high school, I played basketball with Dennis Dexter (UCLA, 1961) we became pretty good friends. He went on to play basketball at UCLA and I went to Santa Monica College. Denny joined Phi Kaps and he invited me and my future wife Sue to come over and hang out at the house a few times. By the time I transferred to UCLA my junior year, everyone already knew I was going to be a Phi Kap. I never even looked at any other houses.

MC: How do you feel that your experiences as an undergraduate helped you professionally?

SCATES: I learned how to manage my time, that's for sure. I had a lot on my plate. I remember my pledge class was about 12 or 13 guys. One of the things we did was water-bomb the actives. They weren't happy, but it was a good time. The point of that story is that I learned how to work hard and still have fun.

MC: You were the head coach for the UCLA Bruins Men's Volleyball team for 50 years, what part did values and principles play during your tenure?

SCATES: One of the things that the brothers instilled upon me was how to behave like a gentlemen and how to act as a man. That was something I always tried to do with my players. I wanted them to understand that they should never do anything to embarrass the team or UCLA. On the other hand, I treated them like men. I never had a bunch of silly rules, just a few important ones. I expected them to be men and they generally did. Some of that training came from the Phi Kaps. I didn't have a lot of structure up to that point. I learned how to behave and act in social situations.

MC: I understand that you were one of the pioneers of NCAA volleyball. Can you walk me through what is was like starting this movement?

SCATES: I was hired to coach volleyball in the fall of 1962. One of the first things I did was establish the first college volleyball league. Before that, the team played a bunch of open men's teams run by various YMCAs. By 1964, I was the commissioner of the Southern California Volleyball Association. We played local schools at the time and eventually had to change the name twice because of involvement of other regional schools. It is now the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation. At this time everything was governed by the United States Volleyball Association, but I wanted to make it an NCAA sport. In 1965 I was able to work with the UCLA Athletic Director, JD Morgan, to get the Japanese Olympic Gold Medal team to come play the US Men's team (of which I was the captain) at Pauley Pavilion to raise money for the UCLA team. We publicized this event through local newspapers like the *LA Examiner*. We had 5,000 people show up to that match, the

- ▶ Sinjin Smith, ranks first all-time with 114 beach doubles victories with partner Randy Stoklos, also a former UCLA letterman. Smith won six Manhattan Beach Open titles, four FIVB World Championship crowns and was voted the AVP's Best Defensive Player three times.
- ▶ Dave Saunders and Doug Partie teammed with Kiraly in the mid-1980s to help the U.S. Team capture its only Triple Crown: the 1985 World Cup crown, the 1986 FIVB World Championship, in addition to the 1988 Olympic championship.


largest crowd to ever come see a volleyball match in the United States at that time. JD Morgan counted the crowd and made a promise to me that volleyball would become an NCAA sport. By 1970, we hosted the first NCAA championships.

MC: 19 NCAA Championships, 27 team and individual records, three undefeated seasons, and a number of other recognitions create an unbelievable resume. What was it like being at the helm of such great teams and how did you establish this culture of excellence?

SCATES: At the beginning I was coaching by myself and I didn't have any assistants, so I had small teams. Later on, I enlisted one of my teammates on the US team to come up to be my assistant. I started carrying more [players] – basketball and football players that I would teach how to play volleyball. I eventually started going out to local high schools and offering free clinics to any coach who wanted to start a team. Palisades High School in particular started developing some great players that I would recruit. They would go to junior college at Santa Monica first, work with the coach there, then come to me. I actually had a lot of guys from Santa Monica on the first three national championship teams. So in short, high school volleyball started after college volleyball. The first great team I had was captained by Sinjin Smith, who went on to win over 100 beach tournaments. That team went 31-0 in 1979. At that time kids started playing high school volleyball and we got great players. I also got a kid named Karch Kiraly, who is now the Women's Olympic coach. He won three gold medals in three separate Olympics. Everything was going our way. We had three players in the 1984 Olympics and four players in the 1988 Olympics. We were able to promote these teams over the radio and have thousands of people attend games. We just had a great brand of volleyball and it was a pretty big deal for a lot of years.

MC: You retired as the head coach of the Bruins after the 2012 season, what was it like stepping out onto the court at Pauley Pavilion for the last time?

SCATES: Actually, Pauley Pavilion was shut down that year for renovations. The 2012 team went 22-7 but we had to play our home matches in the John Wooden Center. We had over 300 of my former players show up for that match and we were able to take a photo with a big banner that had all 19 of our championships on it. They also played about a twelve minute video. We beat BYU three

straight that night. All the greats came back as well as old coaches. Players from Norway and all over the country were there. It was a special night.

MC: Since your retirement, you have been an analyst for the new PAC 12 network. What has that experience been like? How different is it than being on the sideline?

SCATES: I retired in June 2012 and started working for the PAC 12 network that September. I have done about 50 women's matches and will be covering nine men's matches this season. Once the men are done in April, I will start up with the women again in September. It's a great experience. I get to travel to all the schools in the PAC 12 and meet with some great coaches. It is fun doing women's games too, as the rules are slightly different than the men.

MC: When not commentating, what does one of the greatest coaches in NCAA history do with his free time? What is a typical day like for the retired Al Scates?

SCATES: Well I get up just before sunrise and go play golf five days a week. I am able to spend time with my wife Sue and take my mother to church and brunch on Sundays. I still do some volleyball clinics and every now and then a speaking engagement. I've been in Southern California a long time, so my wife and I keep busy with friends in the area as well. They ask me all the time when I visit Pauley Pavilion if I miss coaching, and my honest answer is "no." We gave it all we could that final season and we beat every good team there was. I was satisfied.

MC: If there is one piece of advice you could give to the members of Phi Kappa Sigma, what would it be?

SCATES: Try to find an occupation that you love. Whatever you do in the future, you have to want to wake up and want to go to work that day. That is the most important thing. Love what you are doing.



to attend both the inaugural Carroll K. Simons Institute and Men of Honor 2014. It was my first glimpse into the international face of the fraternity. I know brothers say this a lot after Men of Honor, but I'll write it down for posterity: even though I had met some brothers less than 12 hours ago I already feel as though I had known them for a long time, and it's a unfamiliar thought that tomorrow when I leave I will not see them again at my chapter house. It is a really strange force at work, especially taking into account our absurdly wide range of interests and upbringings. I am just glad to know where ever I go, whatever chapter house I visit, I will pretty much fit right in immediately.

I took that thought back to Georgia Tech. Within our bubbles, in our chapters, we sometimes feel as though there are inconsolable sects, cliques, or divisions amongst the brotherhood. We fight fervently over issues, as men always do. We always focus on what is different, and that hurts our ability to reconcile. Sometimes issues like bylaw amendments for parking spaces or the location of semi-formal is not an issue worth fighting over. Focus on what we have in common and compromise will come sooner.

How do we remind brothers what we have in common, what is important? The ritual. Brothers 160 years ago performed the same ceremonies we did, and they understood the importance of supporting the common thread of history. No matter how lame it sounds, bring back the ritual to your chapter and do it often. This will be one of the few times you can have the whole brotherhood in one room and be on the same page about

Lastly, we learned some valuable insight into leadership, chapter improvement, and plenty of other administrative features. Y'all have probably been thoroughly saturated by that barrage of information from national. I will say instead leadership comes with experience and time, knowing who the chapter is and who you are. Sounds incredibly cheesy, but even if national teaches you how to drive, you will need practice with your own machine around the track; to know the responsiveness around curves, to know how much brake to apply before the bend, these are things you need to know and train to make it around that track in a competitive time.

The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society has been the national philanthropy partner of Phi Kappa Sigma Fraternity for over 20 years. Many of our Chapters have devoted time, money and effort to this noble cause in that time. Some of our members have battled a blood cancer, or know someone who has. In fact, sadly, one of our members, Eric Jones (2013) at the University of North Texas, just passed from leukemia last year. To honor him, and others who have battled these terrible diseases, we would like to renew and strengthen our partnership with The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society.

THE LEUKEMIA & LYMPHOMA SOCIETY: FOCUSED ON ONE GOAL — A WORLD WITHOUT BLOOD CANCERS

More than 1 million Americans are living with, or are in remission from, leukemia, lymphoma or myeloma—collectively known as blood cancers. One third of those newly diagnosed will die within five years. Yet, the number of people coping with blood cancers is relatively small compared with 80 million Americans with heart disease or 30 million with Type II diabetes.

This is where The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society (LLS) comes in. LLS funds research based on unmet medical needs of patients, without restriction by commercial return. Today, LLS is the world's largest not-for-profit health agency dedicated to finding cures for blood cancers. Since its founding in 1949, LLS has invested nearly \$1 billion in research, funding many breakthroughs and now fueling an explosion of innovative science and clinical successes. Once unimaginable, new safe and effective treatments are saving lives not someday, but today.

To give but one example, LLS has played a vital role in development of T-cell immunotherapies, with breakthrough

results recently reported in the press. By genetically engineering patients' T cells (a type of immune cell), the LLS-funded team trained patients' own immune systems to seek out and kill cancer cells. One of those patients was 8-year old Emma Whitehead, whose leukemia was so advanced that doctors said her major organs would fail within days. Emma was the first child given the immunotherapy; she achieved complete remission and shows no signs of cancer nearly two years later. The results of the study have been nothing short of astounding, with 90% of patients with Emma's type of leukemia achieving remission. LLS began investing in this therapy as far back as 1992, committing \$20 million over the years. Without LLS, this remarkable research achievement simply would not have happened.

Many LLS-funded discoveries apply to other cancers as well. In the last 12 years, almost half of all the cancer therapies approved by the FDA were developed for blood cancers, nearly all with LLS support, and many are now h selping patients with other cancers. For example, T-cell immunotherapy is now being tested for pancreatic cancer. Hope is on the horizon.

"Someday is Today" is more than a tagline for LLS. It is an expression of our organization's commitment to ending blood cancers. While we still have far to go to achieve a world without blood cancers, progress is happening right before our eyes, thanks in no small part to committed partners like Phi Kappa Sigma who provide support to make the research possible. Thank you for being our partner in the fight against blood cancers. ▶

PURSUING THE FULFILLMENT OF THE DOCTRINE OF EXCELLENCE

THE ICONS FOLLOWING EACH SCHOOL NAME SYMBOLIZE WHETHER OR NOT a Chapter has satisfied objectives representing areas of excellence in Fraternity life. The key below includes the eight objectives set forth in the Doctrine of Excellence, which was created and approved by the Grand Chapter in 2004.

FRATERNITY

Achieve a minimum of six of the following:

- ► Active Chapter size is equal to or above 20.
- ► The number of NMs initiated is equal or above 30% of the Active Membership (based on # of actives at the beginning of each academic year) for the year.
- ► Chapter has a written year-round recruitment plan.
- ► Chapter uses the Pillars New Member Education program to educate all New Members.
- ► The Chapter conducts one (1) Ritual meeting per month and has all Ritual Paraphernalia.
- ► Chapter conducts at least one Brotherhood Building Activity per month.
- ► Chapter produces and distributes a newsletter once per year (electronic or hard copy) and maintains/submits to HQ a current alumni contact list.

FINANCIAL COMMITMENT

Achieve a minimum of four of the following:

- ▶ All invoices are paid no worse than Net 60 and Chapter has zero (\$0) balance with International Headquarters and all other creditors at June 15th.
- ► Chapter has a written policy/process in bylaws to address delinquent payments by members.
- ► Chapter submits a budget at the beginning of each academic term.
- ► Chapter submits income statements and balance sheets on a monthly basis.
- ► Chapter completes & submits IRS Form 990 if required.

PERSONAL CONDUCT

Achieve all three of the following:

- ► Chapter is in good standing with Phi Kappa Sigma and University with regard to Chapter conduct.
- ► Chapter has a Judicial Board process described in their bylaws and uses it to adjudicate issues with members.
- ► Chapter complies with all Phi Kappa Sigma and University Risk Management policies/quidelines; Chapter submits an Officer Compliance Form to HQ in September.

🔨 LEADERSHIP

Achieve a minimum of four of the following:

- ► Chapter conducts weekly Chapter meetings during the academic year (based on an academic year calendar).
- ► Chapter conducts at least one (1) planning retreat each year.
- ▶ Officers maintain officer notebooks addressing roles/responsibilities, action plans and notes on lessons learned.
- ► Chapter has a Chapter Advisor approved by HQ. Chapter Alpha communicates with the Chapter Advisor at least once per month.
- ► Chapter has current chapter-approved bylaws which have been distributed to the entire membership within the past year.

○ INTERNATIONAL SUPPORT

Achieve all two of the following Tier 1 foundational points

- ► Chapter distributes information sent from the International Headquarters that concerns the Chapter to all members (e.g. "Chapter Updates")
- ► Chapter submits Roster with detailed contact information (including alumni advisor(s) and housing corporation board using HQ-approved Roster template.
